Tough and suited to urban conditions	Hardy with good Autumn colour especially in cooler climates	Shade tree tolerant of urban pollution and limited root space	Great for narrow spaces	Well suited to low rainfall and dry sites	Yellow bark on young branches is distinctive and sooty black winter buds make this a great specimen tree	Good for smaller gardens and wind tolerant so useful as a screen
